NEW ONLINE RESOURCES

We have expanded our full-text access to The Daily Gazette with the acquisition of its <u>historical</u> <u>archive</u>, covering the years 1921 to 1997. The archive is browsable by date and keyword searchable. Content consists of scanned copies of the original newspaper, allowing users to explore visuals such as photographs and advertisements. Have fun poking around.

We also recently acquired <u>Feature Films for Education</u>, which provides access to hundreds of feature films ranging across decades of cinema. Many films come with various subtitle and Closed Captioning options.

Online access to the <u>New England Journal of Medicine</u> is now available! Our subscription also includes <u>NEJM Evidence</u>, <u>Catalyst</u>, <u>NEJM Journal Watch</u>, and <u>NEJM AI</u>.

Schaffer currently provides access to the following commercial streaming services via a Roku stick: Netflix, AMC+, The Criterion Channel, Amazon Prime, Flix Latino, Max and BritBox. Roku sticks may be checked out at the User Services Desk for a period of 4 hours.

NEW DIGITAL CONTENT AVAILABLE

The abstract volume for the 2025 Mohawk Watershed Symposium is now online. The symposium brings together scientists that research the physical aspects of the Mohawk Watershed in New York State and highlights recent and on-going work in the watershed. In addition, 15 years and 458 abstracts of past Mohawk Watershed Symposium abstracts are available digitally in ARCHES at https://arches.union.edu/MWS.

LIBRARIAN/STUDENT PUBLISHED ARTICLE

Digital Collections & Preservation Librarian Corinne Chatnik, along with Computer Science student James Gaskell (UC 2025), had an article accepted for publication in the peer-reviewed Code4Lib Journal. The article, "Quality Control Automation for Student-Driven Digitization Workflows," discusses the purpose and theory behind the quality control application they created for evaluating images created during the digitization process, and how hands-on experience with digitization workflows helps to inform automation, methodology, and user interface decisions. James is a work-study student in Schaffer Library's digital program. The article will be published in the forthcoming April issue at journal.code4lib.org.

TEACHING ARTWORKS 2024-25 IN THE MANDEVILLE GALLERY, SCHAFFER LIBRARY, AND FEIGENBAUM CENTER FOR VISUAL ARTS

On View: Fall 2024 - June 2025

This academic year, the Mandeville Gallery, and locations in Schaffer Library and Feigenbaum Center for Visual Arts will display artworks requested by Union College professors for use in teaching. These artworks are part of the College's Permanent Collection, a term used to describe the collection of art that the College has amassed over its more than 200-year history. The works chosen for teaching this vear include photos from the Andy Warhol Foundation; a recently gifted collection of Chinese ceramics; works by Native American artist, Jaune Quick-to-See Smith and Greek artist, Chryssa Vardea, as well as by former Union professor of visual arts, Arnold Bittleman. The entire portfolio of twenty-seven prints entitled Sultana's Dream, by artist Chitra Ganesh, and prints by artists Robert Rauschenberg, Roy Lichtenstein, Robert Graham, and Frank Stella round out the selections.

Artworks acquired throughout the College's past two centuries, feature historical, cultural, scientific, artistic, and political concepts that can be used in the classroom to mirror learning methodologies, theories, histories, and philosophies. Engaging students with thought-provoking works of art broadens knowledge of other cultures, increases critical thinking and historical empathy, and sparks creativity. In recent years, the Permanent Collection has focused on acquiring modern and contemporary works of art to enrich academic curricula, and give students and faculty opportunities to engage in object-based learning and make connections across disciplines.

UPDATES FROM RESEARCH & ENGAGEMENT

ESCAPING THE WINTER DOLDRUMS

If you've been in Schaffer Library during the fall and winter terms, you might have seen small groups of excited students running around the library asking about the "wireless wizard." They were participating in Escape Rooms which are embedded in First Year Inquiry (FYI) courses and designed to teach basic library skills in a fun and engaging way.

Many first year students are overwhelmed by the array of library services and resources, and the library as a space. Our goal with the Escape Room is to allow students to explore the physical library and learn how to do basic library searches, physically locate materials, and learn about some of our services (including asking librarians for help) in a fun, low stress, interactive way.

We don't expect students to walk away knowing everything; we see the Escape Room as a teaser to what the library can provide. One student summed up the activity by saying, "I still don't fully comprehend every part of the library, but today was definitely a start."

The statistics speak volumes. This fall and winter, we've hosted 25 Escape Room sessions for 312 students. From post-participation surveys:

- 36% of students reported being encouraged to ask questions and learning where to go to ask librarians questions,
- 42% reported learning how to search Primo,
- 34% reported learning how to locate a physical book in the stacks, and
- 12% of students indicated they learned how to check out a book from Schaffer Library.

As you look ahead to next academic year, consider incorporating this engaging introduction to library and research services into your FYI course! We introduce a new narrative each year, and next year our theme will be The Lady in White - a spooky library mystery.
